Biography: Officer Chancey brings more than 17 years of experience in corrections and counseling to the dialogue on New Hampshire's behavioral health crisis. She has worked as a correction's officer, unit counselor case manager, licensed drug and alcohol counselor, and probation/parole officer. Officer Chancey serves on the Hillsborough South Adult Drug Court Team and performs contract training work for the University of Cincinnati's Criminal Justice Institute. She received her Master of Arts in Mental Health Counseling from Rivier College (now Rivier University) in 2007.

Biography: Attorney Guptill represents indigent clients in felony, misdemeanor, and juvenile delinquency matters from arraignment through trial and sentencing. He serves as a member of the Hillsborough County South Adult Drug Court helping clients to rebuild their lives and avoid reoffending through supervised substance use treatment. Attorney Guptill helped draft policies for an innovative felony settlement conference program, which were adopted statewide, as part of the Settlement Conference Working Group. He graduated summa cum laude from the Georgetown University Law Center in 2013.

Nikki Casey

Director, Revive Recovery Center

Biography: As a woman in long-term recovery, Nikki Casey is passionate about recovery and educating the public on substance use disorder. Early in her recovery, she managed a sober living house and later became a Certified Recovery Advisor for Aware Recovery Care, the country's first in-home addiction treatment program. Currently, Ms. Casey serves as Director of Revive Recovery, Nashua's first recovery center, co-chair of the Rights and Democracy Board of Directors, and as an advocate for legislation supporting affordable acupuncture as a tool for withdrawing from opioids.

Allen Irwin

Peer Recovery Support Manager, Revive Recovery Center

Biography: Mr. Irwin is a lifelong resident of Nashua who is in long-term recovery from heroin addiction. He has managed and built sober houses in the Nashua area for Rise Above, and he has worked as a RAPS specialist, providing client-centered care coordination for Granite Pathways. Today, Mr. Allen is the Peer Recovery Support Manager at Revive Recovery Center. He sits on the Board of Directors for New Hampshire Helping Addicts and is active in organizing volunteers and outreach efforts for Syringe Service Alliance of the Nashua Area (SSANA).
